"Read this First"

When I was a kid, after the cartoons, pancake breakfast, tether ball and playing in our tree fort on Saturday morning, I would come back in the house, fall down on my stomach in front of the TV and watch Tarzan. I loved that show! But there was one thing it impressed on me. I had a fear of it my entire childhood. Quicksand! It sounds silly now, but it was a true fear.

God knew that in this world darkened by sin, there would be many things we would be afraid of and we could easily struggle with it all our lives. The fears of adults look different than the fears of our childhood. Our fears are the fear of failure, the fear of success, the fear of the future, the fear of death. The word fear is mentioned more than 300 times in the Bible. And over and over again, God says "Do not be afraid." In this lesson, we will compare and contrast our fear and God's faithfulness.

Chapter 1 Study Questions

I am an instruction reader. I don't like taking the time to read the instructions, but I won't get started on a project without first unfolding the huge instruction sheet that comes with the project, putting on my glasses, and even grabbing a magnifying glass to read it. My husband, Phil, is the opposite. It always amazes me how he begins a project or uses a new product without first reading what needs to be done! What is even more amazing is that almost all of the time, he doesn't need the instructions and it all comes together just as it should. He's just smart like that. But occasionally, he'll start a project and come to a place where he doesn't know what to do next. Using the instructions as a last resort, he'll mutter the directions under his breath and after a slight pause...he'll say the familiar, "Oops". Then, he'll typically have to go back a few steps, or even start over and follow the guidelines to get it right.

Ultimately, instruction readers and non-instruction readers find that they are grateful someone smarter than them took the time to create a guide to follow so that the end result is exactly what the designer planned.

When we are going though a difficult or dark time, it can be a challenge to believe that God has a plan or a purpose in it. But if we will follow God's instruction book, we'll find His design reveals His purpose.

Chapter 2 Study Questions

I see the following happen in the movies all the time: Someone is suddenly thrust into a desperate time – a financial collapse, impending doom from a meteor headed for earth, the dinosaurs or aliens are getting closer to the hiding place, zombies are banging at the door, sharks are falling from tornados. Someone says, "What are we going to do?" which leads to a panic attack sounding something like this. "What's going to happen? How can we get away? What about the kids? Are we going to die? You can't go out there! Don't leave me! Why is this happening? Who is going to save us?" This goes on until suddenly, someone gets a hard slap across the face. The "slapper" grabs the "slappee" by the shoulders and says "Get a grip!" Then the slapper begins telling the slappee all the reasons why it is going to be ok.

I'm grateful that during my times of panic God doesn't send someone to slap me in the face, but He has sent prophets to speak and slap me to my senses with their words.

"O Jacob, how can you say the Lord does not see your troubles? O Israel, how can you say God ignores your rights? Have you never heard? Have you never understood? The Lord is the everlasting God, the creator of all the earth. He never grows weak or weary. No one can measure the depths of His understanding. He gives power to the weak and strength to the powerless. Even youths will become weak and tired, and young men will fall in exhaustion. But those who trust in the Lord will find new strength. They will soar high on wings like eagles. They will run and not grow weary. They will walk and not faint." Isaiah 40:27-31 NLT

Chapter 3 Study Questions

My nurses were all so sweet to me in the hospital. Because my cancer was rare and serious, and because my chemo was extremely strong, I was on a special floor similar to ICU. Each nurse and tech only had a few patients, so we all received lots of attention. I really didn't cry a lot, but sometimes at night and I felt lonely, I would turn my head away from the door and sob. As I wrote earlier, I didn't cry over dying because I wasn't afraid about that. But I cried over my 1 year old granddaughter, Emma Jo. If I died, she would never know me. I imagined my family showing her pictures of me saying, "This is your Grandma. She was so nice, sweet and funny. She loved you very much." Yep. That would make me cry.

Anyway, when my techs would come in my room and see me crying, they would always come over and pat me on my leg and say, "Don't cry, babee. Don't cry, babee". (I had a lot of Indian techs.) When they would say it with their cute accent, that always made me smile. A part of me thought, "Don't tell me not to cry! I want to cry!" and then another part of me would love hearing that sweet voice, and I would stop crying, roll over and thank them.

Chapter 6 Study Questions

One of the many things I learned from my dad about my spiritual journey was this: Typically right after a spiritual "high" (youth camp, weekend leadership retreats, church mission trips, church choir trips), there would be a spiritual low. And he was right! Almost always when I came back from a time of great fellowship with God on a church mission trip, in the midst of my commitment to honor God and obey His word, I would be tripped up by a selfish act with my siblings, or a stubborn attitude with my parents. My physical cave was my bedroom and my emotional cave was a sullen withdrawal. I noticed it and did not like it! But I felt trapped by it.

After my dad explained this phenomenon to me, I was much more able to be on guard for it. He also pointed me to the story of Elijah that I talked about in Chapter 6. I remember being fascinating by that story and realizing that our enemy, satan, is still trying to use the same trick on us as he did in Bible times!

I want to invite you to stop now and read the whole story of Elijah in I Kings 18 and 19. Do your best to read it in The Message version, or the New Living version.

1. Draw a timeline of some major times in your life. Start with a straight line (birth). Draw the line up to represent good times, and draw the line down to represent bad times. Write the events that caused the line to go up or down. (marriage, deaths, children, salvation, job promotions, moving, illness, etc.)

2. Is your line straight? If it is, then you haven't lived long enough! I imagine that your line has some ups and downs. Try to remember your emotional or spiritual response in your up times. Write what you thought about in the good times.

3. Write what you thought about in your down times. Everyone has down times, but did you feel alone in yours? Or did you wonder where God was? Write down as much as you can remember.

4. Look at 1 Kings 19: 9-10. What did Elijah answer when God asked him, "What are you doing here?" Where was his focus?

5. In this story, when Elijah wasn't running, what was he doing?

Can you see yourself in this story? When you are down, your focus is on you and your problems. And when you aren't running from your problem, you're sleeping! Sometimes it does feel like you just need a break from your problems. I know you noticed that the first time Elijah rested, God was with him and refreshed him with food and water and told him to rest some more. It is important to get proper nourishment and proper rest when you are in a dark and dire time. But you can't sleep your life away, there is more to do!
